


What We Do


Our work

- Secondary mission: offer preservation consultation and conservation treatment for other cultural heritage institutions.




View of wet lab as you enter the south end of the department. This area is used for treatment and disaster recovery.









A (stiff board German-lapped component) paper binding with detached and worn parts




A red-rotted full leather binding with failed prior repairs. Boards are detached.




19th - 20th century music scores are printed in Cincinnati. They are in need of treatment prior to digitization


A rare facsimile of a Latin palimpsest



Hebrew Union College - Seder Haggadah shel Pesah

Author DESCRIPTION:

This is a 17th century printed text owned by the Hebrew Union College. The title translates to, "The order of the telling of Passover" and is the fourth copy owned by the college. The binding is used frequently in the reading room as a teaching tool for visiting groups of scholars because the copy contains numerous hand colored etchings throughout the text. It is the only copy the college owns that contains illumination. Haggadah scripts are generally dirty, much like this one, because they are historically used to tell stories at the dinner table. As most Jewish text does, this book reads right to left.

This is a full leather tightback binding, bound in dark brown calfskin. There are decorative gold tooled panels on the upper and lower boards and rolled lines along the board edges. The stiff boards consist of scale board. The endsheets are marbled. There does not appear to be any spine decoration on the remaining leather spine fragments and there are no closures.

Textblock

The textblock is sewn through the fold on eight single cords that are laced into the boards. The sewing thread is a thick white thread. There are no extant endbands. The edges of the textblock appear to be cut.

The textblock paper is a thin soft-sized handmade laid paper.

The manuscript consists of Hebrew and Aramaic and Rashi script and all are printed in black ink. Throughout the text, at the beginning of a message, large font has been hand colored in either red or blue tempera paint. Throughout the text there are numerous etchings (possibly engravings?) printed throughout the manuscript, as evidenced with metal plate marks. The printed imagery is hand colored with various colored pigments and gold. The hand coloring may be watercolor or tempera.





Conservator's Note

This is a four-part arist book. The plate and stopper were housed in a lidded box with rare-earth magnet closures and Volara and Ethafoam supports. The glass bottle and scroil were housed in a cloth covered box with hinged lid. The scroil was wrapped in polysert film and supported with a tube created at the end. It was then wrapped in Ethafoam sheeting and stored inside the glass bottle. A modified Japanese-tyle wrap-around case was created to house the two boxes. All boxes and enclosures were created using binders' board, Canapetta Coth and PVA.






Photographic Documentation

- Intake, evaluation, photo doc request form
- Our setup and basic shooting parameters
 - Tethered Camera Control Pro
 - Raw format nef
 - ISO 100, aperture priority, Adobe RGB colorspace
 - Minimal processing to the images color correction, exposure compensation, minor distortion control & cropping
- Number of images is dependent on the projected treatment, provenance, etc.






















Fun with VideoDoc: Lining a Oversized Map (Edition 3)

A couple months ago the lab received an oversized map from the Public Library's collection. The map is from 1863 and depicts the businesses of downtown Cincinnati at the time. The Public Library would like to digitize the map, however when it arrived in the lab it had a variety of creases, stains and losses. It was also previously lined with cloth. Conservator, Ashleigh, and Sr. Conservation Tech, Catarina, began the work of removing the map from the prior cloth lining, washing the detached sections of the map to assist in removing the prior cloth lining adhesive, and locally humidifying and flattening the creases and distortions in the paper (caused when the map was previously lined).

Next up, lining the map with kozo fiber tissue and a mixture of wheat starch paste and methyl cellulose. For this, Ashleigh and Catarina created a make-shift light table, since the Lab's was not large enough and began piecing the sections of the map back together. I couldn't not document this climactic part of the treatment, so I went a little crazy, threw my go-to documentation equipment out the window (i.e. our Nikon DSLR), grabbed my iPhone and made a little video to illustrate the process. I hope you enjoy it!


